## **CONGRESS TRACKS**

## BRAIN AND GENETIC NETWORKS

Focus on (basic) neurosciences with special attention to neural networks in the brain studied with MR imaging, EEG or TMS. The interacting network of brain, environmental and genetic factors e.g. epigenetics, polygenetic risk scores, GWAS.

## SOCIAL AND FAMILY NETWORKS

Focus on networks including peers, families and professionals. Family functioning, parenting and the effect of interventions on the development of psychopathology. The importance and impact of bullying, or support from peers on children and adolescents

## EHEALTH NETWORKS

Focus on the importance and challenges that eHealth and other innovative tools (VR, smartphone apps, serious gaming, online CBT etc.) represent and can add to the field of child and adolescent psychiatry. The importance of the online world for youth and professionals to connect and form a network in which mental health care is acceptable and easily available.

## **DETERMINANTS**

Focus on social, psychological and biological determinants of mental illness in children and adolescents. Consider social exclusion, adverse childhood experiences (ACEs), poverty, loneliness, parental mental illness/substance use, intellectual disability. GxE interactions; exposomes.

## **DEVELOPMENT**

Focus on normal brain, psychological, cognitive and emotional development of children and adolescents, including the transitional phase to adulthood. Secure attachment, social function / cognition, executive function.

## PREVENTION & INTERVENTION

Focus on initiatives / studies aiming at prevention of mental illness, early intervention and enhancing resilience in children and adolescents. Include transdiagnostic approaches, infant mental health, studies in high-risk populations, and education on mental health at schools.

## **TREATMENT**

Focus on pharmacological and psychotherapeutic forms of treatment, and other (novel) forms of treatment. Also, studies on adverse effects of treatment, or treatment enhancers are relevant for this track. Presented work is preferentially based on novel research, but systematic reviews and scoping reviews may be considered relevant.

## COVID-19

SARS-CoV-2, the cause of COVID-19 infections impacts (mental) health and daily life of all. Adverse psychological effects on children and youth appear widespread and are potentially devastating for a considerable portion of the population. Submissions may include effects of the pandemic on families, mental health care, assessments and outcome of psychopathology in youth. In addition, effects and proposals for interventions and improvements of healthcare systems.

## • YOUNG PROFESSIONALS

One of the most intense and meaningful periods in the lives of professionals is the journey from medical school graduation to board certification in the field of child- and adolescent psychiatry. In this track, educational updates, thoughts about the future of Child- and Adolescent psychiatric services, but also sessions on career development and the identity of CAP are included.

### PRACTICAL INFORMATION

#### TIME ZONE

Time Zone UTC+01:00

#### LANGUAGE

Dutch is the official language in the Netherlands, however English is widely spoken. The official congress language is English and no translation/interpretation services will be offered.

#### EMERGENCY

In emergency situations, you can contact the local police, ambulance service, fire department and other emergency services by calling 112.

#### **MEDICAL SERVICES**

Should you need to see a doctor or a dentist, we recommend contacting your hotel's reception desk who will direct you to the medical professionals assigned to the hotel. If immediate medical attention is required, call the emergency services at 112. Emergency medical services (including transportation by ambulance) are not free and you will be billed for any services rendered

#### **TRAVEL HEALTH**

There are no specific health risks associated with travel to The Netherlands. Ensure coverage by your own health insurance and bring necessary documents on the trip. If you are a European citizen from within EU/EEA, a European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) gives you access to medically necessary, state-provided healthcare during a temporary stay in The Netherlands.

#### ELECTRICITY

The standard electrical voltage in the Netherlands is 230 volts AC, 50Hz (hotel bathrooms may also have outlets for 100 volts). The electrical outlets in the Netherlands take twopronged, round-pin plugs. We recommend that you purchase an adaptor for your electrical equipment prior to your arrival.

#### WATER

Tap water is safe to drink in Maastricht.

#### DISTANCE

Distances in Maastricht are given in kilometers. 1 mile = 1.62 kilometers

#### CURRENCY

The monetary unit is the Euro (EUR). Bank notes are printed in values of €5, €10, €20, €50, €100, €200 and €500; and coins in values of 1, 2, 5, 10, 20 and 50 cent, and €1 and €2. If changing currency, it is recommended to request smaller value notes of €5- €20 as it can be difficult to find establishments to take larger notes. It is advised against taking larger notes as problems regarding counterfeiting mean they are rarely accepted.

Major credit and debit cards (some restrictions apply to American Express and Diners) are accepted in shops, restaurants and hotels, but in some they are not, be sure to check before ordering. Cash can be withdrawn with your Visa, MasterCard, Maestro or Cirrus card at any ATM.

If your country of residence is outside of The Netherlands, you may qualify for a sales-tax refund for purchases. You need to request a form for your refund at the shop when making you purchase.

#### **ATMS & CREDIT CARDS**

ATMs are widely available throughout Maastricht and most are open 24 hours a day. Most stores accept all major credit cards, however grocery stores, cafes and some restaurants will only accept cash.

#### TIPPING

At restaurants it is possible that you will be charged a cover charge of between 1-3 euros per head and most people choose to round up to the nearest Euro after this, but you can leave more for excellent service. Some restaurants also charge an additional service charge on the bill which can be around 10% in which case you do not need to leave anything additional. These charges should be written on the menu or made clear before ordering. Tipping taxi drivers is unusual but appreciated if they have assisted with luggage. Most people prefer to round up to the closest Euro to avoid handling small change.

#### WEATHER

The average temperature for June is 16 - 24 Celsius. Even though it is summer we do recommend packing some waterproof clothing for the occasional rain shower.

#### TEMPERATURE

Temperature is given in degrees Celsius. Celsius to Fahrenheit: multiply Celsius by 1.8 and add 32 to convert to Fahrenheit.

## **BERNADKA DUBICKA**

Policy, politics, and youth mental health - Playing our part in a global challenge

Bernadka Dubicka is a Professor of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry at the Hull and York Medical School, University of York, UK; an Honorary MAHSC Professor, University of Manchester; Editor in Chief of the Journal of Child and Adolescent Mental Health; and a practising psychiatrist in the Greater Manchester Mental Health Trust, UK. She is also treasurer of the Union of European Medical Specialists CAP section, and was the recent chair of child and adolescent psychiatry, at the Royal College of Psychiatrists (RCPsych), UK. Her career has integrated clinical, academic, media and policy expertise to highlight the importance of child mental health, reduce inequalities, and the need for preventative, systems of care based on co-production with young people. Her research interests have focused on increasing access to evidence based interventions for adolescent depression, and she is currently leading a large depression trial (BAY). Recent policy interests include advisory work on the impact of technology and the ecological crisis on mental health, where she represented RCPsych at COP26 in Glasgow.



## TOBIAS BANASCHEWSKI

Pharmacotherapy in disruptive disorders

Tobias Banaschewski. MD. PhD. is Professor of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry at the Medical Faculty Mannheim of the University of Heidelberg, Medical Director of the Department of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry of the Central Institute of Mental Health (CIMH), as well as and Deputy Director of the CIMH in Mannheim, Germany. He is also Chairman of the European Network for Hyperkinetic Disorders (EUNETHYDIS) and Member of the European ADHD Guidelines Group. He was President of the German Society of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, Psychosomatics and Psychotherapy (DGKJP) and Coordinator of the German (S3) Guideline on ADHD. His main research focus is on developmental psychopathology, neuropsychology, neurobiology and psychopharmacology of ADHD, ASD and comorbid disorders. Dr. Banaschewski studied psychology and medicine at the University of Marburg (Germany) and received his training as in Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and Psychotherapy at the University of Göttingen (Germany).

## **KEYNOTE SPEAKERS**



MARIT SIJBRANDIJ

Addressing trauma and adversity in children and adolescents in global settings

Prof. dr. Sijbrandij is Professor in Clinical Psychology and co-Director of the World Health Organization Collaborative Center for Research and Dissemination of Psychological Interventions at the Vrije Universiteit (VU) University Amsterdam, the Netherlands. Her research is focused on the prevention, early detection and treatment of mental health problems following trauma and adversity in a global context and in vulnerable populations.



## **GABRIELLE CARLSON**

Irritability, Outbursts and Emotion Dysregulation: Transdiagnosic and Very Impairing

Gabrielle A. Carlson, M.D., professor of Psychiatry and Pediatrics at State University of New York at Stony Brook since 1985, founded and directed the Division of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry until 2013. Dr. Carlson has written over 300 papers and chapters on phenomenology and treatment of child and adolescent depression and bipolar disorder. Her most recent interests involve the impact of mood and behavior dysregulation in children and adolescents.

Dr. Carlson has won numerous awards including the APA's Blanche F. Ittleson Award for research in child and adolescent psychiatry, the Agnes Purcell McGavin Award for Prevention in Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, and AACAP's Virginia Q Anthony Outstanding Woman Leader award. She was also awarded the American Psychopathological Association's Zubin Award, for an her contributions to psychopathology research. Dr. Carlson is past president of the International Society for Research in Child and Adolescent Psychopathologym past chair of the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry's (AACAPs) Program Committee. She has also frequently been "the most requested speaker". She is AACAP's President from October 2019 to October 2021.



## **BRUNO FALISSARD**

Did we take the right train in promoting the concept of 'Neurodevelopmental disorders'?

After some initial training in mathematics and fundamental physics (Ecole Polytechnique, Paris), Bruno Falissard engaged in medical studies and specialized in Child and Adolescent Psychiatry in 1991. His PhD was in biostatistics and his post doc in psychometrics and exploratory multimensional methods. He was assistant professor in child and adolescent psychiatry in 1996-1997, associate professor in Public Health in 1997-2002 and full professor in Public health from 2002. He is at the head of the "Center of Epidemiology and Population Health" (500 members). He is co-author of more than 400 papers and author of 4 books. He has a clinical activity in child and adolescent psychiatry. His personal areas of research are about methodology and epistemology of mental health research. In 2015 he became president of IACAPAP (International Association of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and Allied Professions, the term ended in 2018) and member of the French Academy of Medicine.



## DOES TARGETTING HIGH RISK FAMILIES IMPROVE CAPRI LIVES OR INCREASE THEIR HEALTH INEQUALITIES?

Kathryn Abel is Professor of Psychological Medicine and Reproductive Psychiatry, Director and Founder of the Centre for Women's Mental Health at the University of Manchester and co-Director of GM.Digital (formerly CAMHS.Digital) for Greater Manchester Mental Health where she is an honorary consultant psychiatrist. Her research interests include sex differences in mental illness; gender and mental health; perinatal mental and physical health; maternal condition and its effects on offspring cognitive development; parenting as a mediator of maternal effects and the outcomes of children of parents with mental illness. She also has an extensive programme of work with women in prisons who self-harm. Her research spans basic research using large data epidemiology and neuroscience techniques, co-development of interventions and randomised trials.

She has over 200 publications and a varied portfolio of public and patient communication of research including the use of film, animation, theatre and a longstanding collaboration with the SICK! Arts Festival. She has edited several books on women and mental health including Comprehensive Women's Mental Health (2017 Cambridge University Press) and the lay reader: 'The Female Mind' (2017) for the Royal College of Psychiatrists. She is a member of the MQ Mental Health charity's DataScience group. She holds a prestigious European Research Council Science Fellowship, is the NIHR National Lead for Mental Health and a National Institutes of Health Research Senior Investigator.

Development, evaluation and dissemination of cognitive behavior therapy for adolescents with eating disorders

Riccardo Dalle Grave, MD, is Director of the Department of Eating and Weight Disorders at Villa Garda Hospital, Verona (Italy). His research within this department has addressed many aspects of eating disorders and obesity, including their diagnosis, maintenance mechanisms, assessment and treatment, and in collaboration with Professor Christopher G. Fairburn he has developed an original inpatient treatment for eating disorders based entirely on enhanced cognitive behaviour therapy (CBT-E), as well as an adaptation of CBT-E for adolescents with eating disorders. Dr. Dalle Grave has a particular interest in assessing the effectiveness of CBT-E in adolescent patients with eating disorders who are significantly underweight in both outpatient and inpatient settings. He is editor of the CBT-E website, and Director of the Italian Advanced Training Course on the Treatment and Prevention of Eating Disorders and Obesity, which trains clinicians in cognitive behaviour therapy for eating disorders and obesity. He also provides expert CBT-E supervision for clinical services in Europe, the USA, Australia, and the Middle East. He is a Fellow of the Academy of Eating Disorders and a member of the editorial boards of several journals on eating disorders.

**KERSTIN VON PLESSEN** 

Tic disorders and obsessive compulsive disorders : aetiology and treatment options

Professor Kerstin von Plessen is a child and adolescent psychiatrist with an interest in the neurobiological basis of mental illness, with a view to prevention and early intervention. She has been professor at the University of Copenhagen from 2012-2017, and from 2017 at the University of Lausanne, as head of the Division of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry (SUPEA) at the CHUV. Her research focuses on the neurobiological basis of neuropsychiatric disorders (TS, OCD, ADHD), as well as the vulnerability of children at risk for schizophrenia and bipolar disorders. The study of these factors, which facilitate recovery, compensation and plasticity, is another line of research. Trained at the Scandinavian school - she completed her specialisation in child psychiatry and her training in psychotherapy in Norway and taught at the University of Copenhagen - Kerstin von Plessen advocates a vision of child and adolescent psychiatry oriented towards outpatient care and facilitation of autonomy of young people and families whenever possible. Proximity is important for patient care, but also for family support. Kerstin Plessen has led several longitudinal studies in the Capital Region of Denmark, at the University of Copenhagen and at the University of Bergen, which study the development of emotion regulation in children with ADHD and TS. Furthermore, she is co-responsible for a study with a longitudinal perspective mapping dimensional assessments of children with a high risk of developing psychiatric disorders (The Danish High Risk and Resilience Study – VIA7).

## **DIANE PURPER-OUAKIL**

## Are psychiatrists trained to mind the gap between child and adult services?

Diane Purper-Ouakil is professor of child and adolescent psychiatry at the university hospital of Montpellier, France. Since 2011, she is head of the child and adolescent unit of the Saint Eloi Hospital. This unit has facilities for both inpatient and outpatient care for young patients and has specialized services for children and adolescents with ADHD and eating disorders.

Between 2016 and 2019, she was medical director of a trust of CAMHS and AMHS services within the CHU of Montpellier. She is also vice-president of the faculty college of psychiatry involved in the ongoing reform of the training curriculum of medical studies and is member of the professional college of psychiatrists.

Diane Purper-Ouakil aims to develop the evidence-base of psychological, neurophysiological and pharmacological treatments, especially for children and adolescents with challenging and enduring behavioural and emotional symptoms. She is involved in collaborative treatment studies, some involving parent programs, an important feature of comprehensive treatment plans for young people with complex needs.

Predicting Individualized Risk for Mood Recurrences in Youth and Adults with Bipolar Disorder

Dr. Birmaher is the Endowed Chair in Early Onset Bipolar Disease and Distinguished Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Pittsburgh, School of Medicine and the Director of the Child and Adolescent Bipolar Spectrum Services. He received his medical degree from Valle University in Cali, Colombia; completed training in general psychiatry at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, Israel, and child psychiatry at Columbia University, New York.

Dr Birmaher is a leader in the study and treatment of pediatric mood and anxiety disorders. In addition, his research has concentrated in describing the predictors, risk factors, course and treatment of childhood-onset bipolar disorder. Throughout his career, he has served as the Principal, Co-Principal or co-investigator for over 25 federally-sponsored research grants and projects. He has authored or co-authored more than 470 publications, numerous book chapters as well as his own book, New Hope for Children and Teens with Bipolar Disorder. Dr. Birmaher has been the recipient of numerous awards over the years including the Colvin Prize for Outstanding Achievement in Mood Disorders Research in 2013 and the Ittleson Award for Research in Child and Adolescent Psychiatry in 2014. In 2018, he received the Gerald L Klerman Senior Investigator Award and the Lifelong Fellow Award from the American Psychiatric Association. For four years and until 10/2018 he was the Program Chair of the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and recently was named Counselor-At-Large of the same association. Through his research, clinical and mentoring activities, Dr. Birmaher has increased our understanding of the risk factors for mood and anxiety disorders, developed and implemented innovative treatments to improve the lives of patients and their families, and trained the next generation of educators, clinicians and researchers.

#### Social-affective engagement in adolescence

Prof. Eveline Crone is full professor in Developmental Neuroscience in Society and she leads the SYNC lab (Society, Youth and Neuroscience Connected). Prof. Crone's research examines the psychological and neural processes involved in self-regulation and social development. All of her work employs a developmental cognitive neuroscience approach to examine the relation between brain development and changes in psychological processes from birth to adulthood, with a special focus on adolescence. Prof. Eveline Crone received her PhD, cum laude, from the University of Amsterdam; her dissertation is entitled: Performance monitoring and decision-making: Psychophysiological and developmental analyses. After her PhD, she spent 2 years as a postdoctoral researcher at UC Davis. In 2005 she came to Leiden University, where she set up the Brain and Development Lab. She was appointed full professor on March 15, 2009. In 2013 she has been a member of the Royal Netherlands Academy of Arts and Sciences (KNAW) and in 2017 she joined the Scientific Council of the European Resaerch Council (ERC), the European Commission's excellence program for Frontiers Resaerch, as of 2020 she is Vice-Present of the ERC's Scientific Council. Since 2020, she is Full Professor at the Erasmus University Rotterdam, with the goal to make impact in society. Eveline has been awarded several prestigious research grants, including a VENI, VIDI and VICI grant by the Netherlands Organisation for Scientific Research (NWO) and two grants by the European Research Council (ERC), namely a Starting Grant in 2010 and a Consolidator Grant in 2016. In September 2017, Eveline received the Spinoza award for her research on the adolescent brain. The Spinoza award is the highest recognition in Dutch Science.

Essi Viding is Professor of Developmental Psychopathology at the Division of Psychology and Language Sciences, University College London where she co-directs the Developmental Risk and Resilience Unit. She is also adjunct faculty at Yale University Medical School Child Study Centre. Her research combines a variety of methodologies in an effort to chart different developmental pathways to persistent antisocial behaviour. Professor Viding is a Fellow of the British Academy and has received several prizes for her work, including the British Academy Wiley Prize in Psychology, the British Psychological Society Spearman Medal, and the Royal Society Rosalind Franklin Award.

## Efficacy and implementation of digitalized child mental health interventions

Andre Sourander, MD is Professor of Child Psychiatry at the University of Turku and he has been affiliated as adjunct or visiting professor in several universities including e.g Columbia University, New York; Nagoya University, Japan; Shantou University, China; Jakarta University, Indonesia . He has published about 300 peer reviewed scientific articles and supervised 25 PhD students. The focus of his work has been conducting birth cohort studies from early childhood extending to adulthood, to identify early psychosocial and biological risk factors for the causes of mental health disturbances, as well as to find keys to the development of interventions focused on children at risk. He has been principal investigator for several randomized controlled trials using remote, digital and phone coaching.

## Genetics & Clinical Practice In Child Psychiatry: Two Worlds No Longer Apart

Jacob Vorstman MD, PhD trained in both child and adolescent psychiatry (clinic and research) and molecular genetics (research). He obtained most of his training in the Netherlands, but also worked for two periods at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia, United States of America. In September 2017 he moved to Toronto, Canada, where he became associate professor psychiatry at The Hospital for Sick Children and the University of Toronto, and holder of the endowed SickKids Psychiatry Associates Chair in Developmental Psychopathology.

Initially, his research focused on the psychiatric and genetic aspects of the 22q11.2 deletion. After obtaining his PhD in 2008, he broadened the scope from 22q11DS to the study of genotype-phenotype relations in neurodevelopmental disorders, in particular autism, intellectual disability and schizophrenia. His ambition is to further insights into the genetic architecture underlying these disorders as well as to improve methods to measure the associated phenotypes. He developed, with Professor Kas at the University of Groningen in the Netherlands, BE-HAPP, a smartphone application for the measurement of social and communicative behaviors, which is currently implemented in several studies generating the first data of this kind.

Dr Vorstman is also the director of the Autism Research Unit at the Hospital for Sick Children; together with his team he initiated a multidisciplinary clinic called DAGSY (Developmental Assessment of Genetically Susceptible Youth), designated for children with genetic risk variants associated with a psychiatric or neurodevelopmental outcomes. His work is funded by several grants, including from the CIHR and NIMH.

She is a child psychiatrist from Belgrade, Serbia, employed at the Faculty of Medicine, University in Belgrade, as a professor at the Department of Psychiatry, where she teaches undergraduate and postgraduate studies. He has been organizing elective classes in the undergraduate studies of Child Abuse and Neglect since 2012, as well as Autism Spectrum Disorders since 2017. She is working at Institute of Mental Health, Belgrade. In the period from 2010-2018, she was the President of the Special Working Group within the Ministry of Health of the Republic of Serbia for the implementation of the Special Protocol of the Health Care System for the Protection of Children from Abuse and Neglect. From 2017, she continues to lead the Special Working Group for Assistance and Support to Children and Families of Children with Autism Spectrum Disorders of the Ministry of Health of the Republic of Serbia. As part of that activity, she led the development of Guidelines for screening, diagnosis and therapy of children with autism spectrum disorders. She cooperates with the Ministry of Health of the Republic of Serbia, the Ministry of Education, Science and Technological Development, as well as UNICEF, the Center for the Rights of the Child of Serbia and others. She is currently the president of the Association for Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and Related Professions of Serbia (DEAPS) and the member of ESCAP Board.

## Critically examining the networks of play and prevention in child and adolescent mental health

Paul is LEGO Professor of Play in Education, Development and Learning at Cambridge University. He also works as a Consultant Child and Adolescent Psychiatrist in the UK National Health Service.

He trained as a doctor in Southampton before obtaining a degree in Public Health from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. He then completed training in Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and obtained a DPhil from Oxford University. From 2012-2017 he led the Child and Adolescent Mental Health Group at Imperial College London.

Paul's research focusses on early child development, including the prevention of mental health problems and the role of play in children's early development. Much of this work has explored the role of fathers, as well as mothers, in children's lives and development. This interdisciplinary research has been supported by Fellowships from the MRC and Wellcome Trust and by substantive grant funding from the LEGO Foundation and the National Institute of Health Research.

Paul is a trustee of the Early Intervention Foundation and the practitioner review editor for the Journal of Child Psychology and Psychiatry.

Dr. Alessandro Zuddas is Full Professor of Child Neuropsychiatry at the University of Cagliari, Italy

Prof. Zuddas earned is medical degree from the University of Cagliari, where he also completed the residences in Pharmacology and Child Neuropsychiatry. He did is basic neuroscience training as a Fogarty Fellow at the National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke (NINDS-NIH) in Bethesda MD. After a period at the Institute of Pharmacology, University of Pisa, he has been Head of the Center for Pharmacological Therapies in Child and Adolescent Neuropsychiatry at the Department of Biomedical Sciences, University of Cagliari; since October 2011 Prof. Zuddas is also the director of the Child & Adolescent Neuropsychiatry Unit at the Cagliari University Hospital (currently "G. Brotzu" Hospital Trust) and the coordinator of the Resident Program in Child Neuropsychiatry at the University of Cagliari.

He is the Principal Investigator in a number of research studies on developmental psychopathology and psychopharmacology, including several EMA registrative clinical trials, four EU 7th Framework Program projects and, currently, an EU Innovative Medicine Initiative (IMI2) project.

Prof. Zuddas is the Chair of the ECNP Child & Adolescent Neuropsychopharmacology Network (recognized also by EnprEMA) and coordinates the ECNP Child & Adolescent Neuropsychopharmacology School. He is also member of the Editorial board of several International Journals in Child & Adolescent Psychiatry.

## ULRICH REININGHAUS (CANCELED)

### 'Shifting the Curve' revisited – new developments and challenges in ecological translation of public mental health provision

Ulrich Reininghaus is Heisenberg Professor at the Department of Public Mental Health, Central Institute of Mental Health (CIMH), Mannheim, and a Visiting Professor at the Health Service and Population Research Department, Institute of Psychiatry, Psychology and Neuroscience, King's College London. His main research interests are in the ecological translation of evidence-based innovations in public mental health provision using innovative participatory, evaluation, and implementation science frameworks and cutting-edge digital technology for delivering evidence-based mental health promotion, mental disorder prevention and mental health care. To this end, his work seeks to identify momentary risk and protective mechanisms, socio-environmental contexts and settings across the continuum of mental health and, in a next step, translate this into novel digital interventions and services - ecological momentary interventions (EMI) in particular - that target these mechanisms, contexts and settings in real time and in the real world.

Professor Reininghaus was awarded a Ph.D. by Queen Mary University of London in 2011. He trained as a postdoc at the Department of Psychiatry, University of Cambridge, and the Institute of Psychiatry, King's College London. His interest in innovative digital assessment and intervention then led him to work at the Department of Psychiatry and Psychotherapy, Maastricht University, where he was last appointed as Associate Professor before he moved to CIMH in 2018 to head the newly established Department of Public Mental Health. Professor Reininghaus has been awarded several competitive fellowships for his work, including by the UK National Institute for Health Research, the Netherlands Organisation for Scientific Research (NWO), and most recently a Heisenberg Professorship by the German Research Foundation (DFG). His current work is funded by several grants, including from the EU, ZonMW, BMBF, DFG, and MWK.

- To improve our conversations/treatments of youth by taking care of what bothers young people
- To trigger/awake professionals how to deal with shared decision making and youth participation on all levels

- Input of Mc Kinsey survey, focusing on 'generation Z'. Results are available before 19th June. The survey concerns mental health issues of youngsters in 6 European countries. The results will be compared with earlier results on the survey in US.
- Input of Two working sessions Sunday morning 19th : 9 – 10.30 AM and 11.00 – 12.30 AM.

In these sessions, we explore youth participation at a local, institutional, national and international level: how to deal in networks of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry with what is bothering youth? These working sessions will be structured as design workshops in which issues on the different levels are ordered along: Problems (what is bothering you?); solutions and How to get on. Particular focus will be on global context issues as Covid (and its impact on mental health of youth), War Oekraine and climate issues.

The input of the workshops will be presented during the policy debate by means of cartoons.

#### RESULTS

- The input of the morning sessions (including input Mc Kinsey survey) determine the agenda of the policy debate. Solutions and 'how to get on' are discussed with youngsters and in respectively the:
  - o Local and institutional setting/context: Matthias Köster
  - o National context and international context: Cassie Redlich

#### CONCLUSIONS

Joerg Federt will summarize the conclusions and recommendations of the debate. He also points out how to deal with the results as ESCAP community in the coming years.
